Support with Childcare for Working Parents

Funded Childcare

You may be able to get

- 15 hours a week if your child is 9 months to 2 years and you are a working parent
- 30 hours a week if your child is 3 to 4 years and you are a working parent

Criteria

- You and your partner must be expect to earn on average at least £183 per week (equal to 16 hours at the National Minimum or Living Wage).
- If you, or your partner, are on maternity, paternity or adoption leave or you re unable to work because you are disabled o having a caring responsibility, you could still be eligible.
- You cannot get the 15 hours government-funded childcare for 2 year olds, if you or your partner, each individually expect to earn over £100,000 adjusted net income or more.

When to apply or 15 hours funded childcare

• 15 hours a week if your child is 9 months to 2 years from age of 23 weeks old

When to apply or 30 hours funded childcare

• 30 hours a week if your child is 3 to 4 years from age of 2 years and 36 weeks

How to apply

You will need to set up a childcare account. Childcare choices website here https://www.childcarechoices.gov.uk/

You will need the following information for you and (if relevant) your partner

- your National Insurance Number
- if you're self-employed, your Unique Taxpayer Reference
- the date you started, or are due to start work
- · details of any other government support you get

<u>Tax Free Childcare</u> could save eligible parents up to £2000 per year for children aged up to 11 or £4000 per year for children aged up to 17 with disabilities. This is a government scheme to help working parents to pay for childcare.

Who can apply?

Working parents who are earning the National Minimum or Living wage for an average of 16 hours a week.

Have no more than £100K income per year.

If one parent is working and the other parent is claiming:-

- Carers Allowance
- Incapacity Benefit
- Severe Disablement Allowance
- Contribution Based employment Support Allowance
- National Insurance Credits because of incapacity or limited Capability for Work

<u>Universal Credit Childcare</u> could save eligible parents up to 85% of their childcare costs for children aged up to 16.

Who can apply?

If you or your partner (if you live with them) will need to be working.

You can claim during school holidays only or all year round. <u>Universal Credit childcare costs -</u> GOV.UK

Funded Education and Childcare for 2 Year Olds

If you are the parent or carer of a two year old and you receive certain benefits you could be eligible to apply for a funded childcare place.

Who can apply?

Your 2-year-old can get funded childcare if you live in England and get any of the following benefits:

- Income Support
- income-based Jobseeker's Allowance (JSA)
- income-related Employment and Support Allowance (ESA)
- Universal Credit, and your household income is £15,400 a year or less after tax, not including benefit payment
- the guaranteed element of Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit, Working Tax Credit (or both), and your household income is £16,190 a year or less before tax

 the Working Tax Credit 4-week run on (the payment you get when you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit)

2-year-olds can also get funded childcare if they:

- are looked after by a local authority
- have an education, health and care (EHC) plan
- get Disability Living Allowance
- have left care under an adoption order, special guardianship order or a child arrangements order

If you're a non- UK citizen who cannot claim benefits

If your immigration status says you have 'no recourse to public funds', you may still get funded childcare for your 2-year-old. You must live in England and your household income must be no more than:

- £26,500 for families outside of London with one child
- £34,500 for families within London with one child
- £30,600 for families outside of London with two or more children
- £38,600 for families within London with two or more children

You cannot have more than £16,000 in savings or investments.

What you will get

Your child will receive 570 hours funded early education over a year. This is equal to 15 hours a week during term time (38 weeks a year) or 11.4 hours a week all year round (50 weeks per year) There is some flexibility with how the hours are used, but they can only be used for a maximum of 10 hours a day.

Your child can start in their funded place from the term after their second birthday.

Funding is available for a range of early years providers, including schools, nurseries, pre-schools, playgroups and childminders.
